



## **1Sky is poised to win on climate with a massive bottom-up campaign for action**

We can win on climate change. The stakes are high, and the time is now. [1Sky](#), a national campaign for bold federal action on global warming, is poised to make a difference not by being a traditional bricks and mortar interest group, but by building a massive field infrastructure for action at a pivotal time of change.

The [stars](#) are aligning for legislation that will make the difference and slow the pace of climate change by limiting carbon pollution.

1Sky has spent the last year amassing more than [350 organizations](#) from all sectors of society to adopt the [1Sky solutions](#) to the climate crisis. 1Sky wants the federal government to: Create 5 million green jobs. Cut carbon pollution by at least 35% by 2020, and by 80% by 2050. Stop all construction of new coal plants, and repower America on renewable energy.

Now 1Sky is working to build and mobilize around this growing consensus. 1Sky's campaign director Gillian Caldwell constructed a bottom-up field operation that is ready to move on a moment's notice. Caldwell explains that the 30 field [organizers](#) planned for 20 states are the lynch pin of 1Sky's campaign. More than 397 of the 435 Congressional districts are covered by volunteer [Climate Precinct Captains](#). And over 130,000 committed climate advocates also have pledged to support [1Sky policy platform](#).

What this means is that when bold climate legislation needs to be pushed, 1Sky is poised and ready. At the beginning of March when the details of the President's budget began to emerge, 1Sky launched [this action](#) to help the President strengthen his goals for reducing pollution. The entire field team is springing in to action. In April, 1Sky will be working with Focus the Nation to have town halls in key congressional districts to keep the pressure on for strong climate and energy legislation. The climate precinct captains and allies and supporters are all working for strong legislation. 1Sky is making a difference now and is the air beneath the wings of the climate movement.
